Black Tusk Trail

Recreationalists around Vancouver were quite upset this fall when they heard that the Provincial Cabinet had passed an order in council requiring the Parks Branch to barricade the road heading towards the Black Tusk trail, one of the most popular back country areas in B.C. The Ministry of the Environment had written this order in council to make the Parks Branch move the trailhead because of the danger of a large rockslide from the Barrier. We finally found out in late October that the order in council had been rescinded in June four days after it had been passed. This is a good example of poor communications between ministries.

Stein River Valley

Time is running out for the Stein River Valley. Plans are being made right now to construct logging roads into the valley. Road construction could begin in 1982 or 1983

FMCBC Mountaineering Course

The FMCBC Basic Mountaineering Course came to a successful conclusion over the Victoria Day weekend with a taste of "winter mountaineering" in the Joffre Lakes Area. The weekend previous 32 of the 38 students enrolled climbed to the summit of Mt. Baker despite high winds and intermittent white-out, a good indication of how strong this year's group was. The only casualty was a calf muscle attacked by a ferocious crampon, though there were some close calls. Knowledge of objective dangers such as avalanches and hidden crevasses was gained by direct experience, particularly by the co-ordinator! Instructor turnout was mediocre - the course needs more committed volunteers if it is to maintain a reasonable standard of quality. Those who lent a hand did a fine job, and to them, I extend a hearty thank-you. And from what the students had to say, they appreciate your efforts as much as I do. Special mention goes to the time and energy put out by Peter Jordan, Doug Fox, Sev Heiberg, Bob Plummer, Manrico Scremin, and Don Serl, and to the FMCBC Safety and Ed Committee for putting up with my gross inability to balance a budget! By the way, the cost of the course per student will probably reach the \$100 mark next year.
